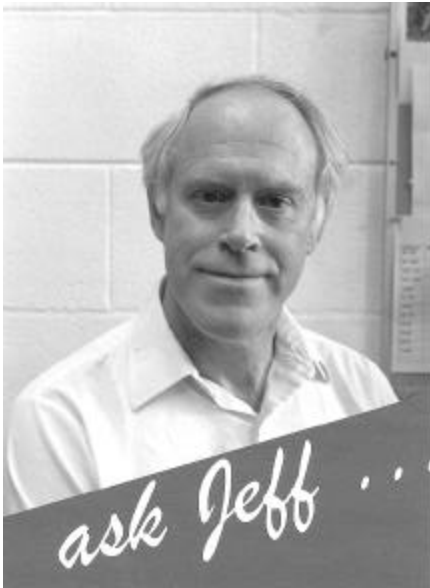

TUITION WAIVERS

All faculty and staff members (i.e. spouse, child) must now complete a tuition waiver form for each semester/session.

U.S. AMBASSADOR TO AUSTRALIA

The U.S. Ambassador to Australia, Mrs. Genta Hawkins Holms, participated in one of Dr. Tom Farley's classes in April. The course, called "Issues and Politics," was part of Dr. Farley's regular teaching load last semester at LHU's partner university in Australia, the University of New England. The Ambassador discussed U.S.-Australian relations and the problems of East Timor with the students.

Some of you may know that the Commonwealth has re-bid their contract with CIGNA which provides for the employer paid basic life insurance (and the supplemental \$10,000 of coverage provided to some System employees and the additional amounts provided to presidents, vice chancellors, and the chancellor). As a result of the rebid, Prudential will administer these life insurance benefits effective 7/1/00.

Prudential should have sent all enrolled employees a "welcome kit" which contained a new certification form and a new beneficiary form to complete and return to them. This mailing should have been sent to employees' home addresses.
