## REPORT ON THE 126<sup>TH</sup> SESSION OF THE APSCUF LEGISLATIVE ASSEMBLY

The 126<sup>th</sup> APSCUF Legislative Assembly met February 1-3 at the Holiday Inn in Grantville, Pa. The morning session on 2/2/01 was dominated by the reports on the negotiations for the Coaches' contract and a thorough discussion of key changes to the by-laws giving the coaches representation on both the local and executive board and delegate seats to the legislative assembly. There has, as yet, been very little movement in negotiations.

One of the coaches will be eligible to serve on our Executive Council. Since there are roughly 350 coaches, they will have approximately 7 delegate seats. There will be a coach/delegate from each of the campuses, but only 7 will have voting rights; this will be handled on a rotating basis.

One rather important development for LHU APSCUF is that because of an increase in faculty, we have been awarded another delegate seat; that means we will move from 4 delegates (00/01) to 5 delegates (01/02). Good news for LHU.

On Saturday, February 3, there were two important issues introduced. The first is that retirement legislation has been introduced. House Bill 100 is a thirty and out bill that should proceed without difficulty. Also, there is House Bill 223, which raises the multiplier from 2.0 to 2.5 for those in SERS. There is more in this Bill than just the changes mentioned since it also has to do with difficulties over temporary faculty members. We need to look closely at all McGuire memoranda requests.

deja true

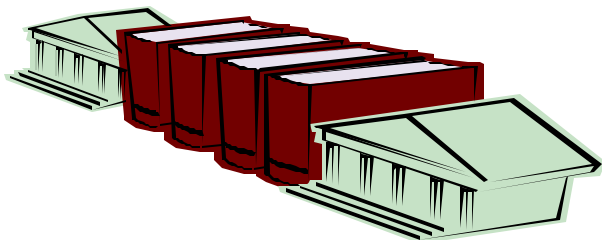
## REALIGNMENT OF DEPARTMENTS

## TLC PRESENTATION

### How to Help Students Use Sources Better.

When your students write research papers for you, do they use too few sources? Use them as padding? Use inappropriate quotations? Use them where they are not needed? Omit documentation for them?

On Thursday, February 23, in a TLC presentation, Professor Bob Myers suggested ways to avoid these problems.

First, you should make clear how your discipline uses sources. Since students encounter different approaches to research in different courses, you should be clear what constitutes a valid source and a valid use of the source.

Then, you might follow Myers's practice of separating the problems of finding valid sources from the problems of using sources well.

Myers uses a packet for the first paper, so that students do not have to find good material. Instead, he can concentrate on teaching how to use summary, paraphrase of quotation to provide a vivid statement in good language that supports a viewpoint, to add clarity, to add another dimension or voice to the paper, to add support from an expert, and to avoid any charges that views were misrepresented. He also teaches how to include a brief statement demonstrating the authority of the person quoted, ways of integrating quotations into the paper, and how to avoid unnecessary quotations.

He demonstrates how a source can serve as a focal point by providing an opinion, facts, or general theory that the writer then accepts, challenges, or refines.

Only after the students have assimilated how to use sources does Myers assign a paper requiring them to find sources. Following such practices may help you get better papers from your students.
